KY: HIGHEST RATE OF CHILD ABUSE IN U.S.

The 1988 Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) directed the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to collect and analyze data on child abuse and neglect across the country. This collection effort is done by the National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System (NCANDS).

All 50 states, including the District of Columbia and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, submit child abuse and neglect data voluntarily. "NCANDS collects case-level data on all children who received a CPS agency response in the form of an investigation response

or an alternative response. Case-level data (meaning individual child record data) include information about the characteristics of screened-in referrals (reports) of abuse and neglect that are made to CPS agencies, the children involved, the types of maltreatment they suffered, the dispositions of the CPS responses, the risk factors of the child and the caregivers, the services that are provided, and the perpetrators."

In March 2019, NCANDS compiled all the data and released the 28th Child Maltreatment Report. In the report, Kentucky ranked first

among all states and more than double the national average of 9.1 victims per 1,000 children. Kentucky had an estimated 22,410 child abuse victims, almost a 30% increase from 2013.

Nationally, 74.9 percent of victims are neglected, 18.3 percent are physically abused and 8.6 percent are sexually abused. The report noted victims may suffer one type of "maltreatment" or a combination of several types of maltreatment. Kentucky's child fatalities from abuse/neglect is one child per 100,000, a decrease from 2013.

Parents were the vast majority of perpetrators of child abuse nationally with nearly 410,000 parents representing about 78 percent of all child abusers. (See page 3 for highlights)



The older child is autistic, so his communication is very limited & his younger sister didn't want to speak to anyone. Around Christmas, the children were moved into a foster home in a different county. Despite the distance, I stayed on. I wanted them to see that at least one, caring adult was there for them. It's been a few months, but their new home has had a positive impact. The older child's teacher thinks he may be able to navigate regular kindergarten for a few hours every day. His sister has begun speaking to the foster parents more each day. Despite the 5-hour round-trip drive, I believe it is worth every second of my time to be able to see the progress these two children have made in just a few short months."

28TH CHILD MALTREATMENT REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

Some other highlights of the report: (continued from Page 1)

- Children in their 1st year of life have the highest rate of victimization at 25.3 per1,000 children of the same age in the national population.
- American Indian or Alaska Native children have the highest rate of victimization at 14.3 per 1,000 children
 in the population of the same race or ethnicity; & African American children have the second highest rate
 at 13.9 per 1,000 children of the same race or ethnicity.
- Seventy-two percent of all child fatalities were younger than 3 years old.
- Boys had a higher child fatality rate than girls.
- The rate of African-American child fatalities is 2.6 times greater than the rate of White children and 3.1 times greater than the rate of Hispanic children.

People started to get worried because I stopped talking to anyone. There would be days that I felt invisible. Like life was just going by like a movie I was watching. I was so sad that the school asked a social worker to check in on me. That's when John started visiting too. He's my CASA. John helped me find a tutor & gives me a ride there every week. My grades are getting a lot better and it's nice having a grown up around more. It was nice to know that I wasn't invisible. It was nice to know that somebody cared.
